

#### A word from our CEO

It has been a busy month in the Corporation with our Heritage Advisory Committee meeting with Rio Tinto, API and MRL. There is a lot of change happening in this space with the State Government moving to repeal the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act (2021) and revert to the Aboriginal Heritage Act (1972). This is a major step backwards. I have been working with the National Native Title Council and a group of PBCs from across the WA to look at ways to ensure that Aboriginal perspectives are taken into account in the changes to the law.

I spend the day with the Robe Valley Operations Senior Leadership Team (RVO SLT) participating in an on-country experience led by Anthony Evans, Marshall Bobby and Naomi Bobby. It was a fantastic day and complemented the trip we took earlier in the year with the Lockyer Family.



This was followed by face-to-face Cultural Awareness Training delivered by Sara Slattery together with Darrielle Lockyer, with Saige Hicks as an observer.



This was one of the best sessions I have been to and I am looking forward to bringing in the other facilitators as we roll this out for Rio Tinto and Minerals Resources. A special call out to Ashley Talbot who has done a great job in pulling this together and creating a fantastic product.





While we were in Pannawonica, we did a site visit to "Camp David" which is on the entry to town. We are looking at establishing a permanent base for the Ranger Team. I expect to have a final decision from Rio Tinto on the lease arrangements soon.

Early voting polling booths are open now for voting for the Referendum. The RRKAC Board adopted a position to support the Voice. It is simply the right thing to do given much of First Nations policy development and practice in this country has occurred without input from First Nations

People. Here is a great message from Michael Barker, an ex-Supreme and Federal Court Judge.

We have been dealing directly with the Robe Valley Operations Senior Leadership Team on employment, business development and, as mentioned above, cultural awareness training since our withdrawal from the Regional Framework Deed in September last year. We are making great progress with 12 Robe River Kuruma members in the process of finalising offers of employment for roles in Pannawonica. Ashley and I have been meeting with the Procurement and the Aboriginal Business Development teams, so I expect to see more progress here as we step it up. There are soon to be 4 RRK Businesses that are qualified as vendors with Rio Tinto, and we are looking at ways to get more on the vendor list and really push for opportunities for RRK businesses.

We are working hard to prepare for the AGM. We will have the family meetings in place again which was a great initiative from the General Meeting we had in June.

I look forward to seeing members in November. Until then, stay safe.

After joining RRKAC in 2021, Tom has led the team through significant change during this time and successfully secured external funding to establish programs to support the RRK community. # **Heritage Advisory Committee Update**

On the 19th, 20th and 21st of September we held a three-day Heritage Advisory Committee (HAC) meeting. The first day the HAC and RRKAC staff discussed a new approach towards Cultural Heritage Management Plans (CHMPs), the second day was a meeting with API, and the third day a meeting with MinRes. The three meetings were well attended by our HAC members.



It is important for RRKAC to lead the way in which RRK People want their cultural heritage managed. This is especially important because of what has happened with the heritage laws in WA. WA introduced a new Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act (2021) but will be going back to the old Aboriginal Heritage Act (1972) by the end of the year. There has been no time for consultation and the WA Government has rushed this through.

RRKAC want to create and uphold best practice cultural heritage management practices that protect RRK Country and Culture. This cannot be done by current laws as proven with the Juukan Caves destruction.

This shift in thinking also comes from our Strategic Plan: Moving from mining-led heritage work to community-led heritage work.

#### How to do this?

When protecting Country and Cultural Heritage through Cultural Heritage Management Plans, how do we make sure:

- Protection and maintenance of our most important places and assets
- Fulfilment of Family and community obligations and expectations
- Capturing and preserving cultural and environmental values.

One of the ways is through a RRK CHMP.

A CHMP is a document that outlines the nature and extent of any cultural heritage present within a proposed development area and the processes that the proponent will use to manage or mitigate impacts or harm to cultural heritage in that area. It outlines how cultural heritage will be protected and managed in conjunction with development proceeding at the same time.

In the CHMP RRKAC will target areas of special significance in the plan area, and define these areas with reference to the Burra Charter that says:

an area of cultural significance means 'a place of aesthetic, historic, social and spiritual value for past, present or future generations'.

These places help understand the past, enrich the present and are of value to everyone now and future generations. These can be places like Jajiwurra, Gunarika, Bungaroo, Sarah's Cave, and other cultural precincts we have talked about. The Proponent who is a party to the CHMP agrees to a range of measures to protect cultural heritage.

RRKAC are developing their own Cultural Heritage Management Plans with each proponent who wants to work on RRK Country. Implementing these CHMPs allows RRKAC to assert our perspective in negotiating our agreements and protecting cultural heritage, where the Aboriginal Heritage Acts fail to do so.

#### Jajiwurra Rangers Update

RRKAC's Jajiwurra Rangers and Heritage Advisory Committee (HAC) are working with archaeologists from The University of Western Australia to record, manage, and protect our places of highest cultural value.

The Desert People Research Project is led by internationally respected archaeologist Professor Peter Veth, and funded by the Australian Research Council Laureate Fellowship Program.

Research on RRK Country is undertaken by the Jajiwurra Rangers and Peter Veth's team, under direction from the RRK HAC.

In September the team undertook excavations in a rock shelter near Sarah's Cave, which aims to expand our knowledge about Sarah, a known person and an ancestor of present-day RRK Elders. Sarah's story is both an oral history and an extraordinary and rare



example of Contact Archaeology and Colonial Resistance.



The research team include four UWA archaeologists including Prof Veth, Chae Byrne, Kane Ditchfield and Wendy Reynen, working with Jajiwurra Rangers Royce Evans, Rodney Alexander Snr, Nathan Evans and Kevin Shaw, and supported by RRKAC staff including Ranger Coordinator Andrew Love, Senior Heritage Officer Alex Walter, and outgoing Manager, Country & Culture Adele Millard.





The excavation uncovered fine examples of habitation and stone artefacts. Proximal investigations found grindstones, baler shell, and historic artefacts.

Next steps will involve radiocarbon dating, usewear and residue analysis, and archival research. Our Jajiwurra Rangers will continue to build their skills and accreditation with the Australian Archaeological Skills Passport.

RRK Country is experiencing significant expansion in resource extraction, with two new mines under construction. **The Desert People Project** helps RRK people to document places of the highest value for their management and protection.



The Ranger Program this month is about vehicles, education and health and well-being.

The vehicles are down in Perth and are having new canopies fitted and should be completed by early October. This will enable us to design and build the interiors so we can more effectively operate out bush. Andrew has collected the 4WD trailer and some equipment whilst in Perth.

Whilst the vehicles are in Perth, Rodney and Royce will be visiting the University of Western Australia Archaeology Department to see what work is done in the office and in the labs after the excavation at the cave site near Sarah's Cave. Rodney and Royce will also be attending three days at the UWA Biodiversity Conference. This will give them the opportunity to meet other Rangers and discuss important land care topics that are unique to the Pilbara.



The Ranger team will be having Sam Ryder a student from the Pannawonica School attend work to gain valuable experience in land management. Sam will be working with the Rangers for 2 half days starting on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> October and then full days each Friday starting on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> October. Sam is currently studying a Certificate 2 in Conservation and Land Management and it will be fantastic experience for him to talk to the Rangers about the course and for him to learn more about Country from our Rangers.



This is one of our school-based initiatives to enable us to bring the vision of RRKAC into the Pannawonica community so we can care for Country and educate the local community in Pannawonica about RRK culture and traditions.

Our final priority this month is for the Ranger team to head out bush and talk about mental health and share stories of how to manage stressful situations and depression.



The RRK community has had a lot of bad luck in recent times, and it effects people in different ways,

so the Rangers will be talking about how they find it best to manage and deal with that bad luck. This trip will also give us an opportunity to discuss any other issues in a safe place so we can help each other with living our best lives.



The Voice to Parliament referendum will be held on **Saturday 14 October**.

The question the Australian people will decide in the referendum reads "A Proposed Law: to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. Do you approve this proposed alteration?"

Progress has been too slow, and politicians from both sides have wasted resources on programs that haven't fixed problems or reached communities.


A recent report from the Productivity Commission found that the gap in social and economic indicators between First Nations and other Australians is not closing, with only four of the 19 targets on track to be met.

All Common Law Holders for the Mardhudunera native title determination are hereby invited to a Common Law Holders Meeting to consider a native title decision.
